CULTURE AND CEREMONIES

Wahkohtowin: A Cree word which denotes the interconnected nature of relationships, communities, and natural systems. Its literal meaning is "kinship". Wahkohtowin focuses on Indigenous storytelling as a method of teaching, the practice of storytelling assists participants in identifying lessons in stories, allowing some professional distance while sharing personal experience to offer a child or youth a little guidance and insight without diminishing the importance of their story.

Rites Of Passage teachings: Explore how biological milestones and cultural transitions shape social status and relationships, from birth to death. Reflect on the universal importance of rites of passage and their impact on individual identity and community belonging.

Winter Solstice Ceremony: Join us in honoring the change of season experiencing a Pipe Ceremony and receive Winter Solstice teachings from Knowledge Keepers.
